

What inspired you to join the Central Scholarship Board?

I attribute the successes in my career to the education I received. Supporting an organization that strives to make education more accessible for others is very appealing. I love that Central Scholarship focuses on Maryland students and that my efforts on the Board of Directors supports students where I live and work.

Do you have a personal connection to the mission of making education more accessible?

I grew up in a household where education was highly valued and seen as a catalyst to success. My mom grew up as a coal miner's daughter in West Virginia and knew firsthand how access to education can lead to greater economic prosperity. My paternal grandfather would recite Kipling poems and tell stories about his experiences and life lessons. As a young boy, I was excited about learning and how it could help me understand the world. STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

KIARA DELOATCH



Ky name is Kiara Deloatch, and I am a graduate student at the University of Maryland Global Campus pursuing a Master of Science in Cyber Operations, with an expected graduation date of September 2026. I previously earned my Bachelor of Science in Cyber Forensics from the University of Baltimore.

My academic journey has not been linear or easy. I became a mother in November 2022 and graduated just over two years later in December 2024, often carrying the weight of uncertainty alongside my coursework. During that time, I experienced housing instability, job loss, and an unsafe personal situation, while also navigating depression and anxiety. Despite these challenges, I remained committed to completing my education.

Central Scholarship played a critical role in helping me persist during some of the hardest moments of my life. The support I received helped cover essential living expenses during periods of instability and allowed me to remain focused on school when survival felt uncertain. Beyond financial assistance, Central Scholarship gave me reassurance that someone believed in me and my future. That belief helped me continue pushing forward and also supported me in landing a strong job opportunity after completing my bachelor's degree.

Looking ahead, I plan to pursue a PhD in information technology after completing my master's degree. My goal is to conduct impactful research and eventually teach practical, real world knowledge that goes beyond textbooks. My education continues to remind me that perseverance matters, and I hope to one day support others navigating challenges of their own, just as Central Scholarship supported me.



YAHELLAH BEST



Y my name is Yahellah Best, and I am expected to graduate with a masters in Clinical Mental Health Counseling from Johns Hopkins University in spring 2026. This year was marked by the loss of my father in May and unemployment since June, making it difficult to stay grounded as a student, emerging clinician, and head of my household. Navigating grief, anxiety, and depression while completing internship requirements tested my resilience in profound ways, but Central Scholarship became a beacon of light during this season. The Stulman Foundation Scholars Grant covered my tuition, allowing me to redirect limited resources toward household expenses, and being featured in the student spotlight at the 2025 Student Awards Ceremony affirmed that my story, and my perseverance, mattered.

Dance has been central to my healing and identity development and after my father, my forever dance partner, passed, I recommitted to integrating dance into my life through classes, socializing, and professional development. I've participated in an Afro-Diasporic Dance and Healing workshop and with support from Central Scholarship's Emergency Fund, will travel to Brazil for an Afro-Indigenous Movement and Healing Retreat this spring. These experiences will inform my clinical practice and future doctoral research in the efficacy of dance and movement in racial healing. The grant also covered my required comprehensive and licensure examinations, bringing me closer to becoming a licensed professional counselor. Central Scholarship's support has allowed me to dream big, even when I've felt small, and I aspire to instill that same hope as the future Dr. Best.




